first truly high profile event have traditionally gone on to enjoy great years, as evidenced by Paul Casey's rise to world No.3 in 2009, and Martin Kaymer's emergence as one of the brightest young talents in golf the year before. It's no secret that the players love beginning their tour campaigns in Abu Dhabi. Most would agree that the Emirates Palace is the best piece of offcourse hospitality they experience all year, while the Abu Dhabi Golf Club's National Course has grown to become a popular and respected layout.

"The course provides a great opportunity to shake off the winter-training cobwebs and if you can play well there, you put yourself in great shape for the rest of the season," says defending champ and the event's only two-time winner, Paul Casey. This year's Ryder Cup captain, Colin Montgomerie adds: "The National is a very good course with a lot of dramatic holes, plenty of chances to pick up shots but always the danger of ruining your scorecard."

If plans go ahead to move the championship to Gary Player's new Saadiyat Beach Golf Club in



2011, Abu Dhabi Golf Club will sign off with easily its strongest field to date. In part this is down to the superb form of the inaugural Race to Dubai's two main protagonists, Lee Westwood (world No.4) and Rory McIlroy (nine), but Geoff Ogilvy (14) and Camilo Villegas (23) will add international star power when they make their debuts in the UAE capital. Joining this illustrious quartet will be Paul Casey (7), 2008 winner Martin Kaymer (13), twice runner-up Henrik Stenson (8) and Sergio Garcia (11), who will be looking to rebound after a poor 2009.

Off the course, event organisers Abu Dhabi Tourist Authority have upgraded the spectator village and improved the event's entertainment offerings. Ticket nformation is available online at abudhabigolf championship.com Daily passes cost AED125 per day, vith a four-day pass available for AED400.

AGE 32 WORLD RANKING: 7 '09 TOURNAMENT WINS: 3



'09 TOURNAMENT WINS: 2




MARTIN KAYMER



atar has built a reputation of attracting popular American players to the second leg of the Desert Swing, and the tournament has once again delivered with the addition of the evergreen Kenny Perry, the 49-year-old Kentuckian who is well established as a serial winner on the PGA Tour. While Perry's inspired performance in the 2008 Ryder Cup matches saw his profile rise outside the US, it was his brave attempt to become the oldest Masters winner in history that won him more admirers.

In truth, Perry should be arriving in Doha as the Masters champion, but consecutive dropped shots on the final two holes in regulation eventually saw him lose out to Angel Cabrera in a play-off. Handling the loss with typical dignity, Perry demonstrated why he has become one of the most popular players on the US circuit.

Golf fans in Doha will also be able to see just what makes Kenny Perry such a prolific winner (14 PGA Tour victories, half of which came after he turned 45) but he isn't the only big name to debut in the event. Columbian Camilo Villegas will be looking to



begin the year with a return to the kind of form that saw him win both the PGA's Tour Championship and the BMW Championship in 2008.

Peter Harradine's formidable course at Doha Golf Club is a proven haven for power hitters, with Spain's freakishly long Alvaro Quiros defending his title, and past winners including big guns Henrik Stenson, Adam Scott and Ernie Els. Arguably the toughest test of the three courses, expect another bomber to add his name to the trophy this year.



'09 TOURNAMENT WINS: 1


